On February 9, 2021, Governor DeWine asked schools and districts to work with their communities and educational stakeholders to help students continue to advance academically and to make up for any learning that may have been lost or delayed due to the coronavirus pandemic and related disruptions.

“This once-in-a-lifetime pandemic has impacted all of us, so it should be no surprise that it has impacted our children. But we should not panic, nor should we be surprised by the results of assessments,” said Governor DeWine. “Instead, we should do what Ohioans have always done when facing a challenge – stay calm, roll up our sleeves, and work to solve the problem.”

Governor DeWine has requested that schools and districts design plans that address learning recovery and extended learning opportunities to meet the needs of students that could include, but are not limited to, extending the current school year, beginning the new year early, extending the school day or instituting summer programs, tutoring, remote options, and other remedial or supplemental activities.

Plans should address, but are not limited to, the following key components:

- **Impacted Students:** How will schools and districts identify which students have been most impacted by the pandemic in terms of their learning progress (with a focus on the most vulnerable student populations)?
- **Needs Assessment:** How will schools and districts identify the needs of those students?
- **Resources and Budget:** What resources are available to address those needs? Generally, what is the budget for the plan?
- **Approaches:** What approaches can best be deployed to address those needs? (This may include approaches such as ending the school year later than scheduled, beginning the new year early, extending the school day, summer programs, tutoring, and remote options.)
- **Partnerships:** Which local and regional partners (such as Educational Service Centers, Information Technology Centers, libraries, museums, after-school programs, or civic organizations) can schools and districts engage in supporting student needs?
- **Alignment:** How can this plan reinforce and align to other district or school plans? This may include but is not limited to Student Wellness and Success Fund plans, remote learning plans, improvement plans, CCIP-related plans, graduation plans.

Each district or school should consider its unique needs and issues and prepare its plan in a way that responds appropriately and leverages the assets of its unique partners including their Educational Service Center and other regional and community-based partners. Each district or school should consider a wide range of representation and voices from district and community stakeholders in planning for learning recovery and extended learning opportunities.

The governor asked schools and districts to provide their plans to the public and General Assembly no later than April 1.

Overview of the District's Proactive Measures

Mahoning County Career and Technical Center (MCCTC) has implemented sound, proactive measures throughout the pandemic. These measures were planned to mitigate the potential effects of the pandemic on educational practices. Students have not missed any lab time; academic coursework was offered in an online format.

Key Proactive Practices

- The district maintained a hybrid model of delivery for the first three quarters of the 2020-21 school year. Students will be in the building full time for quarter four. The district took proactive measures to lessen the potential impact of COVID 19 effects on student learning including but not limited to:
 - The addition of another full-time special education teacher at the start of the 2020-21 school year
 - Increased para professionals for small group intervention
 - The addition of Panorama – a data visualization and progress monitoring tool
 - Increased social emotional supports and mental health screening and counseling
 - Targeted intervention on the day's student were present in the building
 - Enhanced targeted intervention and tutoring for struggling students on additional days in the building (their "home" day on the hybrid schedule).

Summer 2021	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The district will provide summer school programming for students who need additional instruction, remediation, or credit recovery courses - Teachers can come in over summer (and receive compensation through Cares Act money) to instruct students who need additional hours towards their programming (examples include Aviation Maintenance and Cosmetology) - The district will provide hands-on, content-rich MCCTC summer camp programs available to all students and to those identified for extended learning in specific disciplines

<p>Ongoing for the 2021-22 school year and beyond</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> - The district will: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Partner with ESC consultants to determine student declines against their historical state assessment data and the scores from spring 2021 EOC testing that took place in our home partner districts (students start attending here in grade 11) - continue to use the Panorama progress monitoring tool, collaborative team meetings, local and classroom assessments, and state assessments to identify student learning gaps. - deliver local, content based assessments to determine potential learning gaps - Utilize WebXam resources to gather formative data prior to the tests - deliver state assessments in required content areas - continue to conduct social/emotional needs assessments and student-level screenings - identify those students who need additional instruction, remediation, or credit recovery courses in our annual summer school program - identify those students who need additional academic and program/content extended learning in our hands-on, content-rich MCCTC summer camp programs. - The district will use data from these activities and others to inform the allocation of available funds to support student needs as identified - <i>Budget</i> – the district leadership team consciously allocated funds towards the plans and initiatives listed above during Perkins budget management planning sessions.
